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Düsseldorf

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Generally

It is the capital of the Rhineland. It is one of the five most important economic cities in Germany. This fair city is home to a large number of companies. On the Rhine, it has two inland ports and houses four universities.





Location

Düsseldorf is located on the lower Rhine. Outside of Administrative District 4, the rest of the city lies on the right bank of the Rhine. Düsseldorf is located southwest of the Ruhr.

Why is it worth visiting?

- **MadienHafen** - a sensational area, which was once a river port, and today is the place of operation for about 700 companies
- **Museums and galleries** - One of the best academies of fine arts on the continent has been operating here for years
- **Nice area** - It is worth adding Dusseldorf to a longer trip around the Rhineland. It is lovely.
- **Shopping in Königsallee** - Massive modernist buildings may be of interest to experts in the genre. Well, it's not to admire architecture that goes to Ko. The street is an open air mall.



Church of St. Lambert

It's fair to say that this is where it all started. The building was built in the 14th century. The temple was rebuilt in 1815, and then somewhat accidentally enriched with the most characteristic part - the spire on the roof. Immediately after the renovation, the wood used for construction warped and twisted. Today, a legend is circulating in the city that after getting married in the church, the virgin will return to its original shape.

Benrath Palace

Built in 1755-73 by Nicolas de Pigage at the request of the palatine Charles IV Theodore Wittelsbach. The architecture of the palace is an example of a style of transition between Rococo and Classicism. In 1966, the building was entered in the register of monuments protection. Currently, the palace houses two museums: the Museum of European Garden Art and the Museum of Natural History



History

City rights were granted in 1288. In 1380, Düsseldorf became the seat of the rulers of the Duchy of Berg, and in 1815 it became part of the Prussian state and the capital of the Düsseldorf regency. In 1946, the city became the capital of the newly created federal state of North Rhine-Westphalia



Curiosities

Dusseldorf is rightfully considered the fashion capital of Germany. Constantly the event changed for weeks or other industry related activities. The Altstadt in Düsseldorf (Old Town) is often a concentration of "the largest long barge in the world" due to the concentration of more than 300 bars and clubs in display areas.
